Your background

My teaching experience spans over 10 years. I trained as a teacher of science (Zoology and Botany) under the Bachelor of Education Science Degree programme offered by Kenyatta University, Kenya. During the four years training, I acquired knowledge and skills in curriculum development, educational psychology, sociology, philosophy of education and environmental conservation and management. I have taught students of different age groups ranging from 14 to 30 years comprising high school, undergraduate and postgraduate students. Since 2010, I have been working as a lecturer at the South Eastern Kenya University, Kenya, teaching courses on environment, conservation, people and sustainability. I have also taught at national and international workshops on assessment of biodiversity and ecosystem benefits to people through spatial and quantitative approaches.

By giving intensive courses to WACOMA students, did you have the chance to deepen your knowledge on the EMJMD from a teacher perspective and what do you think about EU funded programmes?

EU funded programmes offer an opportunity to students from developing countries to not only go through education in Europe but also offers an opportunity to interact and learn from the cultures of the countries they visit.
